

# A Letter from the Elders of Fellowship North

To our Fellowship North Family,

Scripture tells us, from the very beginning:

*"...that sin is crouching at your door, its desire is for you, but you must rule over it." - Genesis 4:7*

Sin continues today causing pain, anger, grief, and division in this world inside and outside the church. The videos over the last few weeks showing the unjust deaths of Ahmaud Arbery and George Floyd, coupled with the video of Amy Cooper calling the police on Christian Cooper while he was bird-watching, have brought our collective frustrations to a boiling point. They have only added to the long, and often overlooked history of this country where injustice and racism have impacted the lives and families of minorities and people of color. It is at this time when the entire world is watching and crying out, that we must stand unified and demand change.

We ask that more so than viewing this Sunday as a celebration, let us all view it as a thanksgiving to God for His faithfulness. We will not falter in continuing to pursue racial reconciliation. God is faithful -- let us think on these things.
